#### **Comings and Goings**

Desmond Skubi arrived at 3:06 p.m.

#### Call to Order

The regular meeting of the Board of Health was called to order using a hybrid setting at 3:00 p.m. by Ms. Megan Dunn.

#### **Roll Call**

Roll call was taken by Ms. Sarah de Jong who reported there was a quorum present.

#### Approval of Agenda Contents and Order

It was moved by Ms. Lisa George and seconded by Mr. Joseph Hund to approve the agenda contents and order. The motion passed with six ayes and two absent (Skubi, Logan).

#### **Approval of Minutes**

It was moved by Ms. George and seconded by Mr. Hund to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of September 12, 2023. The motion passed with six ayes and two absent (Skubi, Logan).

#### **Public Comment**

Chair Dunn opened the floor for public comment. No one from the public volunteered to speak and Chair Dunn closed public comment.

#### Public Hearing – Snohomish County Board of Health Code (SR 23-009E; R. Gray)

Ms. Ragina Gray shared that no changes have been to the Board of Health Code and no written public comment has been received. Ms. Janet Anderberg noted a scrivener's error in the code.



Chair Dunn opened public hearing on the Board of Health Code. No member of the public volunteered to speak and Chair Dunn closed the public hearing.

After amendment, it was moved by Mr. Jared Mead and seconded by Ms. Janet Anderberg to approve Ordinance BOH23-01 adopting the Snohomish County Board of Health Code, amending a scrivener's error which would strike the words "from the" on line 15 of Section 1.20.040. The motion passed unanimously with one absent (Logan).

#### Public Hearing – Environmental Health Fee Schedules (SR 23-012C)

Ms. Gray shared that no public comment has been received on this item and no changes have been made since this item was last presented to the board.

Chair Dunn opened public hearing on the Environmental Health Fee Schedule. No member of the public volunteered to speak and Chair Dunn closed the public hearing.

As only elected members of the board are allowed to vote on the fee schedules, the Board chose to perform an advisory vote in support of the fee schedule.

It was moved by Ms. George and seconded by Mr. Desmond Skubi to support adopting the fee schedule. The motion passed with seven ayes and one absent (Logan).

It was moved by Mr. Hund, and seconded by Mr. Mead to approve Ordinance BOH 23-02. The motion passed with three ayes and one absent (Logan).

#### Action

Proclamation Recognizing National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week (SR 23-020; N. Thomsen) Ms. Nicole Thomsen read aloud the proclamation.

It was moved by Mr. Hund and seconded by Mr. Skubi to approve the proclamation recognizing National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week. The motion passed with seven ayes and one absent (Logan).

#### Briefings

#### Community Equity Advisory Board (SR 23-021; N. Thomsen)

Ms. Thomsen introduced Clarence Shaw and Mindy Woods, both members of the Community Equity Advisory Board and all three provided background about the advisory board and the work it performs.

#### Board of Health Administrative Rules (SR 23-017C; N. Thomsen)

Ms. Thomsen gave a brief history on this item, noting that previously the board requested Chapter 2.50 relating to the Code of Ethics be further built out before approving the Rules. Board members discussed the Code of Ethics section and an ad hoc committee comprised of Megan Dunn, Desmond Skubi, and Julie Smith will form and meet later in the month to work on that section and bring recommendations back to the full board.

Amendment to Board of Health Fee Schedules (SR 23-026; R. Gray)

#### **Background**

Following Board of Health approval of the Environmental Health fee schedule on October 10, 2023, a number of scrivener's errors have been identified that could be seen to alter the intended interpretation of included fees. This ordinance serves to correct those errors.

#### 1.40.030 Solid Waste Fees (page 2, lines 24-25 of fee schedule)

Under the section "Permits for Solid Waste Sites (Valid July 1 to June 30)," the top section states: *CLOSURE (ENGAGED IN) or CLOSED (prior to 2/10/2053) LANDFILL* The date "2053" should have read "2003." The proposed change for this section will correct the date so that the section now reads:

CLOSURE (ENGAGED IN) or CLOSED (prior to 2/10/2003) LANDFILL

#### 1.40.040 Food Safety Fee Schedule (page 6, lines 40-41 of fee schedule)

Under the section "Plan Reviews," regarding the fee for "a) Tap Room / Tasting Room / Vending Machine," the description for the fee was cut off and the words "Inspection Fee" were not included, instead reading:

#### Plan Review & Pre-Operation

The fee for this service is intended to include both the plan review activities AND the pre-operation inspection. The proposed change includes adding the words "inspection fee" to the description so that the description now reads:

Plan Review & Pre-Operation Inspection Fee

#### 1.40.090 Land Use Fee Schedule (page 10, lines 28-29 of fee schedule)

Under the section "ALTERATION (Licensed Designer Submittal)," regarding the fee for "d) As-Built Submittal / Reserve Area Designation – Concurrent with Building Clearance Review," the fee is listed as:

\$315

A 5% increase over the previous fee should have been \$215, but the numbers were entered in error. The proposed change for this section is to change the fee to read:

\$215

#### 1.40.090 Land Use Fee Schedule (page 11, line 10 of fee schedule)

Under the section "CONTRACTOR CERTIFICATION - INSTALLERS, M & M

### SPECIALISTS OR PUMPERS," for the fee "d) Examination (INSTALLERS or PUMPERS ONLY)," the description for this fee was left off. It should have read: PER EXAMINATION

The proposed change is to edit the description for this fee to include this change.

#### 1.40.090 Land Use Fee Schedule (page 12, lines 25-31 of fee schedule)

Under the section "REDESIGN/RESUBMITTAL," language has been edited to exclude the resubmittal option. This is a change that was made a few years ago under the Health District when Permit Technicians were added to the program. Designers are now required to pay a fee to submit a redesign, but if a designer simply needs to make a small edit and resubmit, those changes do not require a fee. The old language was erroneously included in this version of the fee schedule and should be removed.

#### 1.40.090 Land Use Fee Schedule (page 13, lines 13-14 of fee schedule)

Under the section "SUBDIVISION OF PROPERTY (PLATTING)" regarding the fee for "d) Final Plat Review Fee – On-Site Sewage System Subdivision,", the description of the fee was left off. It should have read:

Per Lot

The proposed change is to add this language to the description.

#### 1.40.100 Vital Records Fee Schedule (page 14, line 29 of fee schedule)

Under the section "BIRTH CERTIFICATES," a fee specific to birth certificates purchased through the electronic kiosk was left off of the fee schedule. This was an existing fee. The proposed changes now include:

d) Certified Birth Certificate – Kiosk \$25.00 per copy

### Policy Issues Drug Epidemic

### **Executive Summary**

The drug epidemic impacts every resident, business, and visitor in Snohomish County. The epidemic continues to evolve as new substances, such as xylazine, emerge. This brief provides an overview of policies that create constraints on our ability to address this issue.

#### **Key Points**

- Snohomish County residents continue to suffer the devastating effects of the drug epidemic, especially as the prevalence of fentanyl use expands and other substances, such as xylazine, emerge.
- While all communities desperately need more resources, especially in behavioral health and substance use treatment, significant impact could be made by changes to state and federal policies.
- ► The complexities of current (e.g., fentanyl) and emerging (e.g., xylazine) trends in drug use and abuse make some federal, state, and local regulations obsolete.

### **Federal**



#### Update the Medicare and Medicaid Act of 1965

This law precludes the federal government providing reimbursement for inpatient care at psychiatric and substance use treatment facilities with more than 16 beds and means Medicaid will generally not pay for medical items and services for incarcerated persons.



#### Change the Standards for Management of Opioid Withdrawal

- The initial dose of methadone allowed by 42 CFR § 8.12 does not adequately mitigate withdrawal symptoms (i.e., dope sickness) for people who use fentanyl. Under the standards, "For each new patient enrolled in a program, the initial dose of methadone shall not exceed 30 milligrams and the total dose for the first day shall not exceed 40 milligrams, unless the program physician documents in the patient's record that 40 milligrams did not suppress opioid abstinence symptoms." (Subparagraph (h)(iii)(3)(ii))
- We strongly believe that physicians should be authorized the discretion to prescribe methadone in an amount they deem medically necessary. This would be analogous to pain management, when the physician can prescribe pain medication in the amount needed to manage the patient's level of pain.



#### Improve Access to Opioid Treatment by Expanding Take-home Programs

- There are currently 1,909 patients in the four Opioid Treatment Programs (previously known as methadone clinics) located in Snohomish County. Using 2021 SAMHSA data, our best estimate is that 20,640 Snohomish County residents are addicted to opioids. Given the explosion of opioid addiction in 2022 and even more so in 2023, it's likely that the actual number today is much higher than 20,640 county residents.
- Senate Bill 644 (S.644) expands access to methadone for an individual's unsupervised use to treat opioid use disorder (OUD). This would revise outdated regulations on methadone treatment for OUD by reducing the time in treatment required for patients to receive take-home doses of medication and allowing pharmacies to dispense methadone for OUD treatment for the first time. It also would codify a recent federal regulation allowing opioid treatment programs (OTPs) to add mobile treatment clinics and would require the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to study existing regulatory flexibilities on accessing treatment for OUD.

#### Remove Unnecessary Barriers that Inhibit Access to Care

- Managed care organizations (MCOs) currently limit medical withdrawal management (i.e., detox) for up to five (5) days without pre-authorization. It would be beneficial to contractually obligate MCOs to authorize up to ten (10) days, especially for those addicted to fentanyl.
- MCOs current limit substance use disorder (SUD) inpatient treatment to twenty-eight (28) days without preauthorization. It would be beneficial to contractually obligate MCOs to authorize up to sixty (60) days, especially for those addicted to fentanyl.



#### Make Necessary Changes to Strengthen Ricky's Law

- Per Ricky's Law, individuals must meet involuntary detention criteria after an evaluation by a designated crisis responder and must be treated at a state-certified secure detoxification facility. If no bed capacity exists, the law does not provide other options for involuntary detention and/or treatment.
- > The law should specify that a person with a history of fentanyl addiction and experiencing a life-threatening overdose should be assumed to be gravely disabled and subject to involuntary detention.
- Snohomish County needs additional secure detox facility space. Currently, King County offers our closest secure detox facility, which is often at capacity. Statewide there are just 77 total secured withdrawal management and stabilization (SWMS) beds: King County (16 beds), Clark County (16 beds), Lewis County (21 beds), and Spokane County (24 beds)



#### Update Educational Standards to Address the Drug Epidemic in Schools

- Current learning standards specifically address marijuana but not opioids such as fentanyl. RCW 28A.150.210 lists four goals for basic education. Goal 2 is for students to, "Know and apply the core concepts and principles of mathematics; social, physical, and life sciences; civics and history, including different cultures and participation in representative government; geography; arts; and *health and fitness* [emphasis added]."
- Enact legislation (Ohio HB 367 as an example, require "boards of education from each local district to select a K-12 health curriculum that includes instruction on the dangers of prescription opioid abuse." We believe K-12 curriculum should include instruction on the dangers of all opioids, natural and synthetic.



Sexually Transmitted Infection Prevention and Treatment Activities (SR 23-023; K. Curtis)

#### **Background**

The Snohomish County Health Department is responsible for following up on all reported cases of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in the county. This includes new cases of HIV.

Our program currently consists of one ARNP, one lead disease intervention specialist, six disease intervention specialists, and one program support staff.

Our disease intervention specialists follow up on all reported cases of chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, and HIV in the county. Our job is to ensure individuals receive appropriate treatment and our staff also follow up with any partners they may have had to get them tested and treated if necessary.

In 2022 we were able to apply for legislatively provided funding to restart STI clinical services. These funds allowed our department to hire a full time ARNP who will begin seeing clients soon. By having a clinician in the department we are able to serve our community with comprehensive testing and treatment services without having to send them to another provider. This removes the barriers of transportation and potentially feeling uncomfortable going to a traditional healthcare provider setting.

Our goal is to prevent further spread of STIs and provide a safe and welcoming environment to everyone.







# **Our approach to stopping STIs**

- Treat the person
- Stop the spread





### **Disease Intervention Specialists**

- Receive reports of a new sexually transmitted infection from a provider or from our own testing
- Reach out to client to find out if they have been treated, ask who their partners are, provide them with options to get treated and get their partner(s) tested/treated
- For clients with new HIV diagnosis ensure they are connected to a healthcare provider for ongoing management
   For those who may have fallen out of care – get them reconnected



# **STI Clinic**

- Funding provided to pilot re-establishing STI clinical services at the Health Department
- Hired a 1.0 ARNP who will see clients here in coordination with our DIS
- Provides a safe space

# **Testing for STIs**

- Chlamydia
  - Swab of areas where sexual activities occur, urine test
- Gonorrhea
  - Swab of areas where sexual activities occur, urine test
- Syphilis
  - Blood test
- HIV
  - Blood test



### Why do we do what we do?

- We want to stop the spread of STIs in the county.
  - STIs are common—<u>1 in 5 people in the US have an STI</u>!
  - The most common symptom of an STI is no symptom at all.
  - People of all genders, sexual orientations, and backgrounds are living with STIs. They do not discriminate and there's no way a person can tell who has an STI just by looking at them or knowing their sexual history.


# ARNP
