Call to Order

The regular meeting of the Board of Health was called to order using a hybrid setting at 3:02 p.m. by Ms. Megan Dunn.

Roll Call

Roll call was taken by Ms. Sarah de Jong who reported there was a quorum present.

Approval of Agenda Contents and Order

Public Hearings

Ordinance BOH25-02 Clarifying Unplumbed Espresso Stand Operation in Snohomish County (SR 25-010B; Ragina Gray)

Environmental Health Director Ragina Gray shared that no comments have been received since this item was presented to the board last month except a scrivener's error that should be amended.

It was moved by Ms. Logan and seconded by Mr. Jared Mead to approve Ordinance BOH25-02.

It was moved by Ms. Logan and seconded by Mr. Mead to approve amendment 1 to the Ordinance. The motion passed with 7 ayes, 0 nays, and 1 absent (Skubi).

The amended ordinance was approved with 7 ayes, 0 nays, and 1 absent (Skubi).

Ordinance BOH 25-03 Addressing Unplumbed Espresso Stand Variance Application Fees (SR 25-011B; Ragina Gray)

Ms. Gray shared that no comments have been received since this item was presented to the board last month.

As only elected members of the board are allowed to vote on matters regarding the fee schedules, the full Board chose to perform an advisory vote for this item.

Ordinance BOH25-04 regarding administrative appeals and SEPA appeals (SR 25-014B; Hailey Fagerness)

Prior Board Review:

April 8, 2025

Background

This is an ordinance that amends section 1.20 in the Snohomish County Board of Health Code (SCBHC), which covers the right of appeals. The Board of Health received a briefing in April 2025 regarding this ordinance. Since then, there has been one revision to address a Scrivener's Error.

The ordinance presented in April was titled "RELATING TO ADMINISTRATIVE APPEALS AND SEPA APPEALS; AMENDING 6 CHAPTER 1.20 OF THE SNOHOMISH COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH COUNTY," which incorrectly names the SCBHC. This ordinance is correctly titled "RELATING TO ADMINISTRATIVE APPEALS AND SEPA APPEALS; AMENDING 6 CHAPTER 1.20 OF THE SNOHOMISH COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH CODE."

The substance of the ordinance is the same as what was presented in April. The two key changes amend what Health Department actions are considered appealable and adds language for appealing determinations issued under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA).

Amending what actions are appealable

Ordinance 24-04 amended section 1.20.020 – Applicability – What may be appealed to state that: *"Any aggrieved person may appeal an administrative decision, determination, or order made by the Health Officer or a Health Department official in the administration, interpretation, or enforcement of the Health Code subject to the appeal procedures in this chapter."* However, it has since been determined that intermediate enforcement actions were not intended to be appealable actions. In order to streamline the appeals process, Ordinance BOH25-04 clarifies that "final" decisions, determinations, and orders are appealable. Intermediate letters would not be considered appealable as a result of this change.

Appealing determinations issued under SEPA

SEPA is a state law that requires local governments to review environmental impacts that may result from a governmental action, such as issuing permits or adopting regulations. For Health Department activities, these reviews are most common in the issuance of solid waste permits for facilities, although this is a somewhat rare occurrence.

There is a defined process in the state law for appealing SEPA-related determinations, but the Health Department appeals procedure is not in compliance with this process. However, Chapter 30.61 of the Snohomish County Code has established processes for environmental reviews under SEPA and the requirements of this chapter apply to all actions of Snohomish County and its departments.

Therefore, Ordinance BOH25-04 adds an exception to the current SCBHC appeals procedure for determinations issued under SEPA. When the Health Department is acting as the lead agency under SEPA, the appeals provisions in chapter 30.61 of the Snohomish County Code would apply instead of the standard SCBHC appeals process.

Board Authority

RCW 70.05.060 (3) Enact such local rules and regulations as are necessary in order to preserve, promote and improve the public health and provide for the enforcement thereof.

ORDINANCE NO. BOH25-04

RELATING TO ADMINISTRATIVE APPEALS AND SEPA APPEALS; AMENDING
CHAPTER 1.20 OF THE SNOHOMISH COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH CODE

WHEREAS, under RCW 70.05.060(3) the Snohomish County Board of Health has authority to enact such local rules and regulations as necessary in order to preserve, promote, and improve the public health and provide for the enforcement thereof; and

WHEREAS, revisions to chapter 1.20 of the Snohomish County Board of Health Code are necessary to clarify that only final administrative decisions, determinations, and orders are appealable; and

WHEREAS, appeals of decisions made by the Health Department under the Washington State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA), chapter 43.21C RCW, must comply with the appeal requirements of that law; and

WHEREAS, adoption by reference of the County's SEPA provisions found in chapter 30.61 of the Snohomish County Code ensures that SEPA-specific appeal requirements are provided for in the Board of Health Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED:

Section 1. Snohomish County Board of Health Code Section 1.20.020, last amended by Ordinance No. BOH24-04 on October 8, 2024, is amended to read:

1.20.20 Applicability – what may be appealed.

Any aggrieved person may appeal ~~((an))~~ a final administrative decision, final determination, or final order made by the Health Officer or a Health Department official in the administration, interpretation, or enforcement of the Health Code subject to the appeal procedures in this chapter. To the extent there is a conflict between the appeal procedures in this chapter and those provided in state law or state regulations, the procedures in state law or state regulations shall govern. For purposes of this chapter, the appealable actions listed in this section are referred to as a "decision."

Section 2. Snohomish County Board of Health Code Section 1.20.050, adopted by Ordinance No. BOH23-01 on October 10, 2023, is amended to read:

1.20.050 Appeal procedure – General Information

A. The appeal process shall consist of a step one appeal and a step two appeal.

1
2 B. A step one appeal shall be an administrative review conducted by the responsible
3 Health Department Division of a final decision, final determination, or final order listed in
4 SCBHC 1.20.020.

5
6 C. A step two appeal shall be a review of a step one appeal decision issued by the
7 Department under SCBHC 1.20.060(E) and shall be conducted by the Hearing
8 Examiner under the ((~~procedures~~)) provisions in chapter 2.02 SCC.

9
10 D. Exception for SEPA appeals. The appeals process provided for in this section shall
11 not apply to an appeal of any decision issued by the department under the State
12 Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). Chapter 30.61 SCC, *Environmental Review SEPA*,
13 adopted by reference as currently exists or subsequently amended, shall apply to all
14 appeals of the department's SEPA decisions including threshold determinations or any
15 appeal challenging the adequacy of an environmental impact statement. An appeal of a
16 SEPA decision associated with an underlying decision, determination or order of the
17 department shall be combined with an appeal of the underlying decision, determination
18 or order and considered together at a combined hearing to be conducted by the hearing
19 examiner under Chapter 30.61 SCC

20
21 Section 3. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance or its application to any
22 person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance or the application
23 of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.

Fee schedule reorganization (SR 25-015; Hailey Fagerness)

Background

This is an ordinance that amends Chapter 1.40 in the Snohomish County Board of Health Code (SCBHC), which outlines the Health Department fee schedule. The intent of this ordinance is to reorganize how the fee schedule is structured and to better reflect Health Department services that are currently being offered. The changes to each SCBHC section are described in detail below:

Section 1.40.020: Miscellaneous fee schedule

Added a uniform variance/waiver fee, which used to be included in program-specific tables. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.030: Solid waste fee schedule

Renamed section "Solid waste plan review" and removed all non-plan review-related fees with the intent of reintroducing in new sections 1.40.031 and 1.40.032. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.031: Solid waste annual permits

Added new section to include all solid waste annual permits that were removed from 1.40.030. Many of the annual permits had an identical fee structure, so these were combined to one row of the fee schedule (with all categories still listed in the title column). Some types of facilities were removed from the WAC when it was updated in 2018, so those categories were not added. No changes were made to the fee amounts.

Section 1.40.032: Miscellaneous solid waste fees

Added new section to include all miscellaneous solid waste fees that were removed from 1.40.030. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.040: Food safety fee schedule

Renamed section "Food safety plan review" and removed all non-plan review-related fees with the intent of reintroducing in new sections 1.40.041, 1.40.042, 1.40.043, 1.40.044 and amended section 1.40.045. Section was also split into subsections to account for both plan review fees and additional plan review fee-related code language.

All plan review fees were listed in 1.40.040(A). Expedited reviews were removed from fee offerings to reflect change in department operations. No changes were made to the fee amounts.

The mobile food unit permit fee credit during permit review (the text of 1.40.045) was included in 1.40.040(B). The variance application for unplumbed espresso stands (the text of 1.40.046) was included in 1.40.040(C). No changes were made to the text of either of these subsections.

Section 1.40.041: General food safety annual permits

Added new section to include all general food safety annual permits that were removed from 1.40.040. “General” is thought of as all food service establishment permit fees for low, medium, and high risk establishments that follow the same fee structure. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.042: Specialty food safety annual permits

Added new section to include all specialty food safety annual permits that were removed from 1.40.040. “Specialty” is thought of as all food service establishment permit fees that do not follow the same fee structure or have additional considerations. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.043: Mobile food unit annual permits

Added new section to include all mobile food unit annual permits that were removed from 1.40.040. All instances of “mobile food vehicles” were changed to “mobile food units” to match state-level descriptors. No changes were made to the fee amounts.

Section 1.40.044: Temporary food safety permits

Added new section to include all temporary food safety permits that were removed from 1.40.040. Recurring events were broken into their own category instead of being grouped under the general low, medium, and high risk categories. No changes were made to the fee amounts.

Section 1.40.045: Mobile food vehicle permit fee credit during permit review

Renamed section “Miscellaneous food safety fees” and removed all text associated with mobile food vehicle permit fee credits. This was moved to 1.40.040(B), as outlined above. Added table to include all miscellaneous food safety fees that were removed from 1.40.040. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.046: Variance application for unplumbed espresso stands

Repealed section, as text was moved to 1.40.40(C) as outlined above.

Section 1.40.050: Illegal drug manufacturing or storage sites response fee schedule

Removed appeals fees, as this is included for all programs in 1.40.020. Added new fee for the sampling of suspected contaminated property in addition to the inspection of suspected contaminated property.

Section 1.40.060: Group camp fee schedule

Expedited reviews were removed from fee offerings to reflect change in department operations. No changes were made to the fee amounts.

Section 1.40.070: School safety fee schedule

Renamed section “School safety plan review” and removed all non-plan review-related fees with the intent of reintroducing in new section 1.40.071. Added new category of plan review for small school construction and clarified that original school construction plan review fee is for large schools. Added new category of plan review for playgrounds. Expedited reviews were removed from fee offerings to reflect change in department operations.

Section 1.40.071: School safety inspections

Added new section to include all school safety inspection fees that were removed from 1.40.070. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.080: Water recreational facilities fee schedule

Renamed section “Water recreational facilities plan review” and removed all non-plan review-related fees with the intent of reintroducing in new sections 1.40.081 and 1.40.082. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language. Expedited reviews were removed from fee offerings to reflect change in department operations.

Section 1.40.081: Water recreational facilities annual permits

Added new section to include all water recreational facilities annual permits that were removed from 1.40.080. Added new category of annual permits for temporarily closed pools. Added new category of miscellaneous aquatic venues/features for cold/hot plunge units.

Section 1.40.082: Miscellaneous water recreational facilities fees

Added new section to include all miscellaneous water recreational facility fees that were removed from 1.40.080. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.090: Land use fee schedule

Renamed section “On-site sewage dispersal systems” and removed all non-OSS dispersal systems-related fees with the intent of reintroducing in new sections 1.40.091, 1.40.092, 1.40.093, 1.40.094, 1.40.095, 1.40.096, and 1.40.097. Expedited reviews were removed from fee offerings to reflect change in department operations.

Section 1.40.091: On-site sewage specialty permits

Added new section to include all specialty OSS permits that were removed from 1.40.090. Specialty is thought of as permit types for more non-traditional OSS dispersal systems, and the section includes composting toilets, holding tanks, and vault privies. A new line was added to the holding tank fees to include a fee for a “change of ownership” process.

Section 1.40.092: On-site sewage alterations and repairs

Added new section to include all alterations/repairs permits that were removed from 1.40.090. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.093: Land use reviews

Added new section to include all land use review fees that were removed from 1.40.090. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.094: Land use contractors’ activities

Added new section to include all land use contractors’ fees, including report submittals, that were removed from 1.40.090. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.095: Subdivisions

Added new section to include all subdivision fees that were removed from 1.40.090. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.096: Water

Added new section to include all water-related fees that were removed from 1.40.090. No

changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.097: Miscellaneous land use fees

Added new section to include all miscellaneous land use fees that were removed from 1.40.090. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

Section 1.40.100: Vital records fee schedule

Repealed section, as fees were moved to 1.40.110 and 1.40.111 as outlined below.

Section 1.40.110: Birth and death certificates

Added new section to include all birth and death certificates that were removed from 1.40.100. Many of these certificates had an identical fee structure, so these were combined to one row of the fee schedule (with categories still listed in the title column). No changes were made to the fee amounts.

Section 1.40.111: Miscellaneous vital records

Added new section to include all miscellaneous vital records fees that were removed from 1.40.100. No changes were made to the fee amounts or fee language.

RELATING TO HEALTH DEPARTMENT FEES; AMENDING CHAPTER 1.40 OF THE
SNOHOMISH COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH CODE

WHEREAS, the Snohomish County Board of Health has authority to establish fee schedules for issuing or renewing licenses or permits or for such other services as are authorized by law and the rules of the state board of health; and

WHEREAS, only city and county elected officials on the board of health may vote on any decision related to the setting or modification of permit, licensing, and applications fees; and

WHEREAS, the Snohomish County Board of Health has determined that a reorganization of the existing Snohomish County Board of Health Code is necessary to improve clarity and effectively communicate the local rules and regulations to the people of Snohomish County; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED:

Section 1. Snohomish County Board of Health Code Section 1.40.020, last amended by Ordinance No. BOH24-01 on April 9, 2024, is amended to read:

1.40.020 Miscellaneous fee schedule.

B. Mobile food unit permit fee credit during permit review

1. Applicants applying for an annual mobile food unit permit for a new establishment will qualify for an application fee credit that can be applied to offset the cost of the annual mobile food unit permit fee if:
 - a. The applicant has not operated a mobile food unit without a valid permit to operate from the department at any time prior to or during application review; and
 - b. After submitting a complete application for an annual mobile food unit permit to the department, the applicant has been issued a temporary food service – single event permit or permits allowing operation of the mobile food unit during department review of the annual mobile food unit permit application.
2. For those applicants qualifying under subsection (B)(1) above, the application fee credit shall equal the sum of all temporary food service – single event permit fees and associated late fees from any permits issued 85 days after the date the applicant submitted a complete mobile food unit annual permit application until the date the department issues its first decision letter for the annual permit. Temporary food service – single event permit fees from permits issued during the first 84 calendar days (12 weeks) after the date the applicant submitted a complete mobile food unit annual permit application shall not be included in the application fee credit. In no case shall the application fee credit exceed 100% of the cost of the annual mobile food unit permit fee.

C. Variance application for unplumbed espresso stands

1. An owner of an unplumbed espresso stand, as defined under SCBHC 3.05.050, that was legally operating on or before March 1, 2022, is not required to pay an application fee when seeking a variance from plumbing requirements listed in chapter 246-215 WAC. Only one variance fee shall be waived for each unplumbed espresso stand eligible under this section. When an unplumbed espresso stand having a current annual food service establishment permit is sold or otherwise transferred to a new owner, the new owner shall either apply for and obtain a variance from the department with payment of any applicable application fees or plumb the stand as required by code to continue operation. Unplumbed espresso stands without a current annual food service establishment permit are ineligible for a variance to plumbing requirements.

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General codified variance & waiver process (SR 25-017; Hailey Fagerness)

Background

When strict compliance with code requirements is impractical or impossible, individuals may request a variance (a modification) or a waiver (an exception) from the Health Department. Approval of these requests allow for actions or activities that do not fully comply with one or more code provisions, within certain regulated Environmental Health programs.

Currently, the Snohomish County Board of Health Code does not have a general, codified process for submitting variance or waiver requests. The department relies on applicable Washington Administrative Codes (WACs), which provide limited criteria but lack important procedural elements—such as appeal rights, fee structures, and applicant responsibilities.

In general, applicants must identify the specific code requirement(s) they are unable to meet and propose an alternative method that satisfies the intent and achieves the objectives of the original requirement. A variance or waiver may only be approved if, in the opinion of the health officer, the proposed alternative or mitigation measure offers equal or greater protection of public health, safety, and/or the environment—and does not result in a health hazard or nuisance.

The local health officer or local health jurisdiction currently has authority to grant variances and waivers in specific program areas, including:

- Solid waste
- Food safety
- Water recreation facilities
- On-site sewage systems
- Smoking and vaping in public places (certain requirements)
- Some drinking water regulations

However, the local health officer or local health jurisdiction does not have authority to grant variances or waivers in the following program areas:

- School safety
- Contaminated properties and illegal drug manufacturing/storage sites
- Camps
- Majority of drinking water regulations

The intent of this ordinance is to:

1. Define "variance" and "waiver"

2. Establish a general process for submitting and evaluating variance and waiver requests
3. Outline procedures for notifying applicants of decisions and informing them of their appeal rights
4. Allow the Health Department to modify or rescind an approved variance or waiver
5. Direct users to the relevant program-specific sections of the code for additional variance and waiver requirements

WHEREAS, under RCW 70.05.060(3) the Snohomish County Board of Health

Section 1. Snohomish County Board of Health Code Section 1.05.020, adopted

“Aggrieved Person” means a person whose interests are, or will likely be, specifically

2. The proposed alternative method or mitigation measure meets the intent and achieves the same objectives as the original code requirement(s);
3. A health hazard or nuisance will not result from the variance or waiver; and
4. Either:
 - a. The proposed alternative method or mitigation measure will result in equivalent or superior protection of public health, safety, and/or the environment compared to the standard from which the variance or waiver is sought; or
 - b. The action or activity for which a variance or waiver is requested is subject to other regulations or requirements that, in the opinion of the health officer, will result in equivalent or superior protection of public health, safety, and/or the environment compared to the standard from which the variance or waiver is sought.

F. Notification of the decision. The department shall provide the health officer's written decision to the applicant regarding the approval or denial of a variance or waiver.

G. Appealing the decision. Any aggrieved person may appeal the health officer's decision on a variance or waiver request in accordance with chapter 1.20 SCBHC.

H. Modification or rescission of the variance or waiver. All approved variances or waivers are subject to conditions set forth by the health officer. The department reserves the right to modify or rescind the approval of a variance or waiver if, in the opinion of the health officer:

1. A health hazard or nuisance has resulted from the approval of the variance or waiver;
2. The person who received the variance or waiver is no longer complying with the conditions of the variance or waiver;
3. New information is discovered by or provided to the department that contradicts the information provided in the variance or waiver application upon which the health officer relied; or
4. New information is discovered by or provided to the department indicating that the information provided in the variance or waiver application on which the health officer relied was fraudulent.

2025 Washington state legislative wrap-up (SR 25-016; Nicole Thomsen)

Background

The Legislature closed session on April 27. Stats for this session:

Bills introduced: 1,953

Bills passed: 423

Budget for public health, as sent to the Governor, is:

- The operating budget adds nearly \$9 billion in new revenue (less than what both the Senate and House Democrats proposed in their budgets). Big investments include housing, K-12 education, public safety (critical for Governor Ferguson), and behavioral health facilities. The budget also includes \$6 billion in cuts. SB 5167 is now with the Governor. He has until May 20 to sign. As a reminder, the governor has line item veto authority.
- **Foundational Public Health Services:**
 - Funding for was reduced by a minimum of \$24 million for the biennium. Final numbers are:
- General Fund contribution: \$129,091,00 for both '26 and '27
- FPHS account spending authorization: \$42,048,000
- TOTAL: \$300,230,000 for the biennium
- \$5M reduction in 2025 general fund foundational public health contribution
- **Snohomish STI Clinic Funding:**
 - 2026: \$689,000
 - 2027: \$689,000
- **Opioid Response/Support:** This year's budget made several reductions in opioid response and overdose prevention, focusing state support and investment on fulfilling state obligations.
 - Community-based and harm reduction approaches to overdose prevention were removed. These include a naloxone stockpile, community education campaigns, and sustainable funding for a data dashboard.
 - \$2.7 million is dedicated to launching a tele-buprenorphine hotline that facilitates access to medications for opioid use disorder treatment.
 - Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs) are designed to ensure access to coordinated, comprehensive behavioral health care. CCBHCs are required to get people into care quickly and serve anyone who requests care for mental health

or substance use, regardless of ability to pay, place of residence, or age. This includes developmentally appropriate care for children and youth. \$886 thousand was dedicated to supporting CCBHCs.

- The Recovery Care Navigator Program, implemented locally by counties, is an intensive outreach and case management program that was reduced by 20%.

- **School-Based Health Centers:** Funding was included in both the Operating and Capital Budgets, including support for operating and maintaining school-based health centers. These facilities are becoming more critical access points for youth behavioral health services, dental clinics, and other preventative primary care services. The total budget included \$2.4 million for the Operating Budget and \$2.6 million for the Capital Budget.

On the policy side some big bills have been signed by the governor:

- HB 1531: This bill preserves the ability of public officials to address communicable diseases.
- HB 1946: This bill clarifies Tribal representation on Boards of Health.
